This national symposium brings together scholars and practicing attorneys to examine an issue at the forefront of legal discussions and political debates in recent years: the changing nature of executive power and questions surrounding its expanded use.

Temple Law Review will publish a special symposium issue in conjunction with this event to highlight various perspectives in the legal community regarding executive power in war and peacetime.

The Symposium features presentations from leading researchers about the history of executive power and current practices that expand the traditional understandings of its use.

Panelists will discuss the recent U.S. Supreme Court opinion *Hamdan v. Rumsfeld* and the detention of "enemy combatants," executive use of the State Secret Privilege and the extent to which national security concerns can prevent the disclosure of information, and President Lincoln's suspension of the Great Writ during the Civil War.



KEYNOTE SPEAKER

Martin S. Lederman is a visiting professor at Georgetown University Law Center. He formerly worked for the Justice Department's Office of Legal Counsel from 1994 to 2002, concentrating on congressional power, federalism, and separation of powers issues, among other topics. Professor Lederman is a regular contributor to several Internet sites about matters of executive power, including detention, interrogation, and torture.
